Summing up Serotonin in Seattle

A word from John Neumaier, Chair local organizing committee

ISSR 2016, Serotonin in Seattle, was a success! 160 scientific registrants attended and were joined by almost 20 guests. The meeting was held at the Edgewater Hotel on Seattle's downtown waterfront and as we were

fortunate to have nice weather, this provided us with ample opportunities to explore Seattle and the vicinity. The scientific program was notable for representing the diversity of serotonin research ranging from CNS to immune, GI, reproductive, and cardiovascular systems with presentations that spanned from basic to clinical data. Plenary lectures by Trevor Sharp, Danny Hoyer, and, most fittingly, the inaugural "Vanhoutte Distinguished Plenary", by Paul Vanhoutte, himself, provided historical perspectives on serotonin research the and professional lives of three renowned investigators. With 18 different symposia, we chose a hybrid model with some plenary and some parallel sessions.

In addition, an open oral session featured 14 individual oral presentations. Some of the 20 NIDA awardees presented during a Pioneers and Prodigies oral session

and others were added to Symposia; all were featured at the Poster session which included about 55 posters in total.

In addition to learning about cutting edge serotonin research, we enjoyed a Wine Tasting and the final night featured a cruise on Puget Sound and a Banquet at Tillicum Village on Blake Island that featured the culture and heritage of the native peoples of Northwest coast. During the closing dinner reception at Tillicum, NIDA Travel Awardees were recognized and awards were given for best student and postdoctoral fellow poster presentations. A highlight of the evening was the presentation of Lifetime Membership to the ISSR to Sheryl Beck, in recognition of her enduring service and loyalty to





the ISSR, including being secretary/treasurer from 2004-2013. In а preliminary look at the conference feedback survey, attending ISSR 2016 encouraged most respondents to develop new collaborations and generated new research ideas these are important outcomes for our all of us serotonologists. Hopefully

we gained new members and encouraged those who have been with the Society for many years to continue to participate and attend future meetings (such as ISSR 2016 in Cork, Ireland!). Thanks to the local organizing committee for all of their work in putting this conference together! Also, a special thanks to our sponsors: ACS Chemical Neuroscience. British Pharmacological Society, Janssen, Lundbeck, Metris, Molecular Pharmacology Division of ASPET, NIDA and Servier for financial support that helped to make this meeting possible.

Preliminary "Serotonin in Seattle" **Survey Results**

Those who attended the Serotonin in Seattle meeting will likely be most interested to know the results of the postmeeting survey. In a word, the overall ratings are "fantastic"! As of October 11, 54% of meeting registrants had responded to the survey. If you haven't yet responded here is still time to participate in this important survey. Your responses are crucial for our ability to continue to organize meetings of the highest scientific quality and appeal. Importantly, results from this survey will be instrumental in renewing NIH funding, which has supported travel awards for the past three meetings, and also, could be useful in our efforts to secure sponsorship for ISSR 2018. But enough of that, here are the numbers...

- 100% responded that the meeting met expectations.
- 66% responded that they would absolutely attend future meetings, and 31% responded they would be likely to attend. This group most often comment that the only deterrent would be not having sufficient funding.
- 87% responded that the meeting was unique among others attended within the last 12 months.
- 28% responded that their research had been moved in new directions as a result of the meeting.
- 76% responded that the meeting had spawned new collaborations.
- 83% responded that new ideas for research had been generated as a result of this meeting

Regarding concurrent (parallel) sessions at future ISSR meetings, 83% voted no, and 17% were in favor. This result is consistent with past surveys, and one that the programming committee will take into serious consideration (as has been done in the past) for the coming 2018 ISSR meeting in Cork.

Ratings for the NIDA Travel Awardees were very high, across the board. NIDA Travel Awardees rated their experience very highly as well. Over 90% of awardees rated their experience in the "outstanding to excellent" range in the categories of 1) interactions with senior investigators; 2) interaction with their mentor; and 3) provision of an environment suited for networking.

In terms of demographics among responders to the survey to date, this is great – 20% graduate students, 15% postdoctoral fellows, 10% junior investigators (Assistant Professors or equivalent), 26% mid-level investigators (Associate Professors or equivalent), 26% senior investigators (Professor or equivalent), 11% academic and 3.5% industry. The latter is an area for concern and we will work toward increasing the presence of industry at future meetings. Finally, 53% of survey responders are female.

Call for Nominations: Councilor and Associate Councilors

We have one Councilor position open for the North America region and one position open for the Rest of World region. Members who are mid-career or senior investigators are eligible to be nominated for a Councilor position.

In addition, we have one Associate Councilor position open for each of our three regions (Europe, North America and Rest of World). Members who are new investigators with less than 10 years experience after obtaining their advanced degree (i.e., PhD, MD, etc) are eligible to be nominated for the Associate Councilor position.

Councilor and Associate Councilors are elected to 4 year terms by the membership of the region they will represent. Terms will begin January 1, 2017.

Please send nominations to Dr. Kelly Berg (berg@uthscsa.edu). When nominating someone, please provide confirmation that the member is willing to serve. Self-nominations are very welcome. Please remember, the nominee must be a current member (i.e., current in dues payment) of the Society.

Deadline for nominations is December 1, 2016.

Major duties of a Councilor/Associate Councilor include:

1. Involvement in the overall operation of the Society including planning of biennial meetings (e.g., selection of program content and travel award recipients), discussions regarding membership development and participation in membership recruitment.

2. Chair or participate in sub-committees formed to oversee various functions of the Society, e.g., raising money/obtaining sponsorship for the biennial international meetings, planning of receptions, increasing registration/attendance at events, and increasing the visibility of the Society.

3. Attend Society events including the biennial meetings, society mixers (SfN) and dinner (FENS), etc

4. Provide information for the Spring and Fall newsletters regarding upcoming and past events, and general information of interest to the Society.

Sheryl Beck Awarded Lifetime Membership to the ISSR

Sheryl Beck was awarded lifetime membership to the

ISSR at the closing "Serotonin in Seattle" dinner reception. Sheryl has been a member of the ISSR (Serotonin Club) since 1987 and a pillar for the Society serving as councilor from 2000-2004 and then as secretary/treasurer from 2004-2013. Sheryl's enduring research interests hold serotonin at the core. She has published numerous seminal



articles describing how substrates of the stress response are involved in regulating serotonin neurotransmission. In particular her research has focused on the long term impact of stress for neuronal function; developmental regulation of the serotonin limbic system; circuitry linking stress substrates to serotonin and other monoamine systems; stress substrates as targets for psychotherapeutic agents, as well as the interaction among serotonin, GABA, glutamate and corticotropinreleasing factor-like peptides. Sheryl retired in June 2014, and while she will always embrace serotonin and the ISSR, she is now able to spend more time enjoying some of her other passions, primary among them, golf, which like serotonin, is known to make you feel good. Congratulations to Sheryl on this most prestigious award of lifetime membership.




The 13th Meeting of the International Society for Serotonin Research University College Cork, Ireland July, 2018


Call for Papers for a Special Issue on Serotonin Research
